Agustín Reyna

Agustín Reyna is Director of Legal and Economic Affairs at The European Consumer Organisation, BEUC. BEUC represents 45 independent national consumer associations from 32 European countries. The primary task of BEUC is to act as a strong consumer voice in Brussels and to ensure that consumer interests are given their proper weight in all EU policies. Within BEUC, Agustín supervises five policy teams (Financial Services, Digital, Consumer Rights, Competition, and Consumer Redress and Enforcement) and coordinates the organisation's work on competition law enforcement. Agustín is EU chair of the Intellectual Property committee of the Trans-Atlantic Consumer Dialogue, a network of over 75 organisations representing consumers' interest in the US and the EU. Since 2018 he acts as non-governmental advisor for the Commission to the International Competition Network. He holds a PhD. in law from the University of Bremen and often publishes in scientific journals on issues related to EU law.



Andreas Mundt

Andreas Mundt has been President of the German Bundeskartellamt (Federal Cartel Office) since December 2009. He is a member of the Bureau of the OECD Competition Committee since 2010 and the Steering Group Chair of the International Competition Network since 2013. After qualifying as a lawyer following studies at the University of Bonn and the University of Lausanne, Switzerland, Andreas Mundt entered the Federal Ministry of Economics where he worked from 1991 to 1993. He then joined the staff of the Free Democratic Party in the German Parliament from 1993 to 2000, where he was in charge of the portfolio of labour and social law. In 2000 Andreas Mundt joined the Bundeskartellamt as rapporteur, with responsibility for banking and card payment systems issues. He was Head of the International Unit of the Bundeskartellamt from 2001 to 2005 and Director of General Policy from 2005 to 2009.



António Ferreira Gomes

Antonio Gomes is Deputy Director of the Directorate for Financial and Enterprise Affairs of the OECD (OECD/DAF) and Head of Competition, Finance, and Investment (DAF Market Cluster), overseeing the work of the Competition Division; the Financial Markets Division; the Consumer Finance, Insurance and Pensions Division and the Investment Division. He previously served as Acting Deputy Director of OECD/DAF (2018-2020), Head of the OECD Competition Division (2016-2018), President of the Portuguese Competition Authority (2013-2016), Senior Competition Expert at the OECD Competition Division (2013) and Director of the Merger Department of the Portuguese Competition Authority (2007-2013). Since 2005, he has been an Assistant Professor at the Universidade de Aveiro, Portugal. Antonio Gomes holds a PhD in Economics from the University of York, U.K., and Master Degrees in Economics from the University of York and the Universidade Nova de Lisboa.



Cani Fernández

President of the National Commission for Markets and Competition (CNMC). She has practiced and lectured EU and Competition Law since 1989. She was référendaire at the Court of Justice of the European Union. Cani Fernández was the first woman appointed as Co-Chair of the IBA Antitrust Committee. She also held the position of Vice-chair of the Economics Committee of the ABA Antitrust Section, Officer of the International Cartel Task Force of the ABA Antitrust Section, and member of the IBA LPD Council. Likewise, she was also a appointed NGA of the EU Commission and the CNMC before the ICN.

Recognized year after year as one of the 30 best specialists in Competition/Antitrust worldwide in the Best of the Best category of the Expert Guides, GCR also singled her out as one of the "100 Women in Antitrust Worldwide". In 2018 and 2019 Chambers named her "Star Individual" in her specialty in Spain. She is the first woman awarded with the "Outstanding Contribution to the Legal Profession" by Chambers.



Cristina Caffarra

Dr Cristina Caffarra is an expert in competition economics who has led for several years the antitrust and regulatory team at Charles River Associates in Europe. She has directed economic analyses in multiple competition investigations on some of the landmark mergers and antitrust matters of the past 20 years, before the EC and the competition agencies of the UK, multiple Member States, and across the globe. She has provided expert economic evidence in multiple litigated cases before the courts (from the General Court in Luxembourg to the High Court and the Competition Appeal Tribunal in London, and many more). She has advised both corporate clients and government enforcers in multiple cases concerning digital companies, media, telecoms, and more.



Eric Posner

Eric A. Posner is Kirkland and Ellis Distinguished Service Professor of Law, University of Chicago. His research interests include antitrust law and constitutional law. He has written a dozen books and more than a hundred academic articles on law and legal theory. His most recent books are *Radical Markets* (Princeton, 2018) (with Glen Weyl), which was named a best book for 2018 by *The Economist*; *Last Resort: The Financial Crisis and the Future of Bailouts* (Chicago, 2018), which was named a best book for 2018 by *The Financial Times*. He is of counsel at MoloLamken LLP, a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and a member of the American Law Institute. He has written extensively for popular media outlets, including *The New York Times*, *The Wall Street Journal*, and *The Washington Post*, and testified before Congress.

In recent years, his research has focused on anticompetitive practices in labor markets, and the role of antitrust law in combatting them. His work in this area includes *Antitrust Remedies for Labor Market Power*, 132 *Harvard L. Rev.* 536 (2018) (with Suresh Naidu and E. Glen Weyl), which received prizes from the Antitrust Writing Awards and the American Antitrust Institute; *A Proposal for Protecting Low-Income Workers from Monopsony and Collusion*, *Hamilton Project* (2018) (with Alan B. Krueger); *Corporate America Is Suppressing Wages for Many Workers*, *The New York Times*, February 28, 2018 (with Alan B. Krueger); *A Proposal to Enhance Antitrust Protection Against Labor*

Market Monopsony, Roosevelt Institute Working Paper (2019) (with Ioana Marinescu); The Anticompetitive Effects of Covenants Not to Compete, CPI Antitrust Chronicle, January 2020; Why Has Antitrust Law Failed Workers?, Cornell L. Rev. (forthcoming, 2020) (with Ioana Marinescu); The Antitrust Challenge to Covenants Not to Compete in Employment Contracts, Antitrust L.J. (forthcoming, 2020); Labor Monopsony and the Limits of the Law, J. Hum. Resources (forthcoming, 2021) (with Suresh Naidu). His latest book, Why Has Antitrust Failed Workers?, will be published by Oxford University Press in 2021. He has also testified on this topic before the FTC.



Giulio Federico

Giulio Federico is Head of Unit of the Recovery & Resilience Taskforce at Secretariat-General, European Commission. He joined the European Commission in late 2011, and prior to his current position he was Head of Unit at the Chief Economist Team of DG Competition. His work at the Recovery & Resilience Taskforce focuses on energy and environmental issues, at the same time as leading the work on the Spanish Recovery and Resilience Plan. During his time at DG Competition, he coordinated the economic work on numerous in-depth merger investigations and on several antitrust matters.

Prior to joining the European Commission he worked in economic consultancy for 10 years and was a Vice President at Charles River Associates. He is a guest Professor at the Barcelona Graduate School of Economics, and was the President of the Association of Competition Economics in 2014 and 2015.

Giulio holds an MPhil and a DPhil in Economics from the University of Oxford, and has published a number of academic and policy papers, on merger-related issues (e.g. efficiencies; remedy design; quantitative methods; bidding markets; and innovation) and on other competition topics (e.g. loyalty discounts; and regulatory and competition issues in energy markets).



Isabelle de Silva

Isabelle de Silva has been the president of the Autorité de la concurrence since her appointment by the President of the French Republic in October 2016. She previously served as president of the Sixth Chamber of the Conseil d'État, the supreme administrative

court, which she had joined in 1994 after graduating from Sorbonne University (1989), HEC Paris business school (1990) and the École Nationale d'Administration (1994). She is an experienced lawyer who held various Government positions. She was a member of the board of the Autorité de la concurrence from 2014 to 2016.



José Luís da Cruz Vilaça

Degrees in Law and Political Economy (Coimbra University); Doctorat en Économie internationale (Université Paris I – Panthéon-Sorbonne); Full Professor of Lusíada University (Lisbon); formerly Professor at Coimbra University, the Catholic University and the NOVA University of Lisbon; former Member of the Parliament and of the Portuguese Government, inter alia as State Secretary for European Affairs (1981/82); former Advocate General at the Court of Justice of the EC (1986/88), President of the Court of First Instance of the EC (1989/95) and Judge at the Court of Justice of the EU (2012/18); chaired the Government Committee who prepared a new Competition Act as well as the Statutes of the Portuguese Competition Authority (2002/03); former President of the Disciplinary Board of the European Commission (2003/07), the Portuguese Association of European Law – APDE (2006/18), the International Federation for European Law - FIDE (2016/18); President of the Portuguese Association of Energy Law - APDEN (since 2019); member of the Portuguese Bar, specialist in European and Competition law - Partner with PLMJ (1996/12), founding and managing Partner of Cruz Vilaça & Associados, Law firm, set up in 2019; author of circa 200 books and articles, has received several decorations and honorary distinctions from Portugal and other EU Member States.



Margarida Matos Rosa

Margarida Matos Rosa is President of the Portuguese Competition Authority (*Autoridade da Concorrência*). She previously worked for the Portuguese Securities Markets Commission (CMVM) and, in the private sector, for BNP Paribas, Santander Investment and UBS Bank, in the areas of economic research, investment banking and investment management. Margarida Matos Rosa holds an M.P.A. from Princeton University and an undergraduate degree in Economics from UC Louvain (Belgium).



Margrethe Vestager

Margrethe Vestager, age 53, is Executive Vice president for a Europe fit for the digital age. She previously served as Commissioner for Competition (2014-19). She was Minister for Economic Affairs and the Interior (2011-14) and Minister for Education (1998-2001) of Denmark. She was Political leader of the Danish Social Liberal Party (2007-14), and has worked for the Danish Ministry of Finance (1993-95). Ms. Vestager holds an MSc in Economics (University of Copenhagen).



Maria Manuel Leitão Marques

Maria Manuel Leitão Marques is a full professor of the faculty of economics at the University of Coimbra and was elected MEP in the last European elections of 2019 for the Portuguese Socialist Party. She is currently vice-chair of the International Market and Consumer Protection committee and a member of the delegations to both the ACP-EU Joint Parliamentary Assembly and the Euro-Latin American Parliamentary Assembly. She is also a substitute MEP in the ITRE and FEMM committees, as well as in the delegation to EU-Mexico Joint Parliamentary Committee. She previously served as Minister of the presidency and administrative modernisation between 2015-2019 and as a secretary of state for administrative modernisation between 2007-2011.



Massimo Motta

Massimo Motta is Research Professor at ICREA - Universitat Pompeu Fabra, and Research Professor of the Barcelona Graduate School of Economics. He founded the GSE's Competition and Market Regulation Programme and he is in the Steering Committee of this Master.

He served as Chief Competition Economist of the European Commission from 2013 to 2016.

Prof. Motta's main areas of research are industrial organisation and in particular competition policy. His work, widely cited and influential, has been published in the leading international economic journals. His book on Competition Policy: Theory and Practice (Cambridge University Press, 2004) is the standard international reference on the economics of antitrust, and is used by teachers, scholars and practitioners. He has recently published a new book on Exclusionary Practices. The Economics of Monopolisation and Abuse of Dominance (Cambridge University Press, 2018) with Chiara Fumagalli and Claudio Calcagno.

He has extensive experience in advising competition agencies on cases and policy, in teaching competition policy (to lawyers, economists, agency officials, and in both undergraduate and graduate courses) and in supervising doctoral dissertations. His former students have obtained important positions in academia, consulting firms, and in competition and regulatory agencies.



Olivier Guersent

Olivier Guersent graduated with distinction from the "Institut d'Etudes Politiques de Bordeaux" in 1983. He joined the French Ministry of Economy and Finance in 1984, where he carried out many investigations for the French Competition Authority. He joined the European Commission in 1992, initially with the "Merger Task Force" in the Directorate-General for Competition. Since then, he has alternated between the private offices of a number of European Commissioners (Karel Van Miert, Michel Barnier and Neelie Kroes) and DG Competition (successively Deputy Head of Unit in charge of cartels, Head of Unit in charge of policy and coordination of cases, Head of Unit in charge of merger control, Acting Director "Transport, postal and other services" and, from 2009, Director responsible for the fight against cartels. From 2010 to 2014 he was the head of the private office of Michel Barnier, Commissioner for Internal Market and Services. Having held the position of Deputy Director-General since July 2014, Olivier Guersent has been Director-General of the Directorate-General for Financial Stability, Financial Services and Capital Markets Union from 1 September 2015 to 31 December 2019. As of 1st January 2020 he is the Director General of the Directorate General for Competition. Married and a father of three children, Olivier Guersent is a member of the board of the non-profit organisation Aremis that provides medical care in the home, primarily to cancer patients in the Brussels area. He is a regular lecturer to postgraduate university students.



Paulo Rosado

Paulo Rosado founded OutSystems in 2001 with a vision to help customers innovate faster and fundamentally change how enterprise software is developed. Staying true to that vision, Paulo has led OutSystems to become a global leader and pioneer in the application development platform market and one of the fastest growing B2B tech companies in the world.

Before starting OutSystems, Paulo co-founded Intervento, an e-business software infrastructure company that was successfully sold in 1999. He also worked for Oracle Corp, where he held multiple positions in R&D and product management. Paulo has participated in multiple executive education programs and holds a Master's in Computer Science from Stanford University and a Computer Engineering degree from Universidade Nova, Lisbon.



Pedro Siza Vieira

Pedro Siza Vieira was born on 14 July 1964. He has read Law in the Law School of the University of Lisbon (1987). Pedro Siza Vieira was teaching assistant at the Law School of the University of Lisbon, assistant professor at Universidade Autónoma de Lisboa and visiting professor at Universidade Católica Portuguesa and Universidade Nova de Lisboa. He was also a lecturer in post-graduate studies and courses promoted by several institutions, including Universidade Nova de Lisboa, Oporto Law School of Universidade Católica Portuguesa, and Law School of Coimbra University, in subjects such as public procurement, administrative litigation, arbitration, banking law, project finance and insolvency. As a lawyer, he was a partner at Morais Leitão, J. Galvão Teles e Associados, Sociedade de Advogados and a partner at Linklaters LLP between 2002 and October 2017, and has served as the Managing Partner of the firm's Lisbon office between 2006 and 2016. He was in the arbitrations panel of the Centre for Commercial Arbitration of the Portuguese Chamber of Commerce and Industry, the Commercial Arbitration Institute of the Oporto Commercial Association, Concórdia (Conciliation, Conflicts Mediation and Arbitration Centre), the Mediation and Arbitration Centre of the Portuguese Chamber of Commerce in Brazil and CREL (Extrajudicial Dispute Resolution Centre of the Ministry of Justice and Human Rights of Angola). He was a member of the board of directors of the

Portuguese Association of Law Firms and president of the Portuguese Arbitration Association. Pedro Siza Vieira has been a member of several working groups for the elaboration of legislative proposals, including the Law of Urban Planning and Building, the Civil Liability of the State and Other Public Bodies and the Portuguese Arbitration Law. He was a member of the High Counsel of the Administrative and Fiscal Courts and member of the Executive Committee of the Task Force for the Capitalization of Companies. Before being appointed Minister of State, Economy and Digital Transition in the current Government, he was Minister Assistant to the Prime-Minister (from October 2017 to October 2018) and Minister Assistant to the Prime-Minister and for the Economy (until October 2019).



Philip Marsden

Philip Marsden is Deputy Chair of the Bank of England's Enforcement Decision Making Committee, and decision maker for competition and regulatory cases at the Financial Conduct Authority, the Payment Systems Regulator and OFGEM. He is also Professor of Law and Economics at the College of Europe, Bruges, teaching the core Masters in Law. In 2018, the Chancellor appointed Philip to the Treasury's Digital Competition Experts Panel, writing the Furman Review 'Unlocking Digital Competition'. In 2019, he joined the government's Open Finance Advisory Group, advising the FCA on how to extend Open Banking to other regulated sectors.



Richard Whish

Richard Whish is Emeritus Professor of Law at King's College London; in 2014 he was appointed QC Honoris Causa. He was a non-executive director of the Office of Fair Trading in the UK from 2003 to 2009, and a non-executive director of the Singaporean Energy Markets Authority from 2005 to 2011. He is the co-author, with David Bailey, of *Competition Law*, 9th edition 2018 (OUP), and the author of many other books, articles, case-notes and book reviews on various aspects of international competition law and policy.



Teresa Moreira

Teresa Moreira, Head, Competition and Consumer Policies Branch of UNCTAD - United Nations Conference on Trade and Development since 5 October 2016, previously served as Consumer Director-General of Portugal from January 2010 to September 2016 and as a Member of the Board of the Portuguese Competition Authority (March 2003/March 2008) when it was first established. She also served as Portugal's Director-General and Deputy Director General for International Economic Relations, and held senior positions at the former Directorate-General for Competition. She worked for 20 years as a Teaching Assistant at the Faculty of Law, University of Lisbon in the areas of International Economic Law and European Law as well as of European Competition Law and European Economic Law (graduate studies).

Teresa Moreira holds a Law Degree and a Masters' Degree in European Law (European Competition Law) by the Faculty of Law, University of Lisbon, Portugal.

Teresa Moreira has also been officer in charge of the Trade, Environment, Climate Change and Sustainable Development Branch, Division on International Trade and Commodities of UNCTAD from February 2020 to April 2021 and she is rotating officer in charge of the Division on International Trade and Commodities of UNCTAD since mid-October 2020.



William Kovacic

William E. Kovacic is the Global Competition Professor of Law and Policy at George Washington University Law School and Director of its Competition Law Center. He is also a Visiting Professor at King's College London. Since August 2013, he has been a non-executive director with the United Kingdom Competition & Markets Authority. With Ariel Ezrachi, he edits the Journal of Antitrust Enforcement. From January 2006 to October 2011, he was a member of the Federal Trade Commission and chaired the agency from March 2008 until March 2009. He was the FTC's General Counsel from 2001 through 2004.
